Three Yolnu concepts in practice:

Warraw'

Wata

Mulka'


<u>Warraw'</u> – temporary ceremonial shelters where the owners of a particular landscape enact ancestral knowledges under the guidance and supervision of their guardians and custodians.

<u>Wata</u> - seasonal winds that explain how each group of Yolnu recognises its place in the world through understanding the winds and breezes that come to them from other places. It talks about being in place and meeting others through connections among places.

<u>Mulka'</u> – a space where Yolŋu elders and emerging generations comfortably sit, support each other, and work respectfully with mindfulness of reciprocal care.













Nurru – dhawalaŋu (custodian of law)

Dämbu-ŋarramirr (supervisor)

Dalkaramirr/ Djirrikaymirr (carries out ceremonies)

Gon-gamanunkumirr (painter) Gumurr-dhukunmirr (carver) Gon-djekulu (gathering and sharing information)

Nurru – dhawalaŋu (leads dancing)


